MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF THE ARMY
THE SECRETARY OF THE NAVY
THE SECRETARY OF THE AIR FORCE

SUBJECT: Foreign Assignment of Negro Personnel

I refer to my memorandum for the Secretaries of Army, Navy and Air Force, dated 27 October 1949, subject as above, and to General Burns' letter to the Deputy Under Secretary of State, dated 13 February 1950, which was forwarded to you for information. A copy of the State Department's reply to the latter communication, dated 1 March 1950, is attached for your information and guidance.

I should like each Department to take full cognizance of the fact that the Department of State interposes no objection, either procedural or substantive, to the continued presence or replacement of Negro personnel, or of Negro or non-segregated units in any areas of the world where Negro personnel are now stationed. In accordance with Department of Defense policy, I should like each Department, in connection with foreign assignments to any of these areas, to insure that no distinctions are made because of race, religion, or national origin.

The Department of State endorses the policy of freely assigning Negro personnel or Negro or non-segregated units to any part of the world to which United States forces are sent; it is prepared to support the desires of the Department of Defense in this respect. Nevertheless, since certain other foreign Governments have indicated from time to time that they do not desire the presence of Negro personnel within their territorial boundaries, the procedure set forth in my memorandum of 27 October 1949 should be followed in the event that you contemplate dispatching Negro personnel, Negro or non-segregated units to countries where no U.S. Negro personnel are now in fact stationed. This will permit the Department of State to discuss the matter with the foreign Government concerned, and to seek its approval sufficiently in advance of assignment action to permit proper planning.
