SUBJECT: NSC 95 - "U. S. Position Regarding a Cease-Fire in Korea"

With reference to your memorandum of December 13 circulating a JCS memorandum of December 12 on "United States Position Regarding the Terms of any United Nations General Assembly Cease-Fire Resolution for the Korean War", I should like to bring to your attention, for information and appropriate circulation, a report with respect to action to date.

The Department of State has prepared and cleared with the Department of Defense a statement of the conditions which the United States Government considers essential to any cease-fire arrangement in Korea. This statement is based on the subject memorandum, by the Joint Chiefs of Staff as approved by General Marshall.

The statement of the conditions which the United States Government considers essential for a cease-fire has been transmitted to Ambassador Gross of the U. S. Delegation to the General Assembly, who together with General Crittenger is meeting today with the three-man committee, chaired by the President of the General Assembly, appointed by the General Assembly to seek to bring about a cease-fire in Korea. The statement of the conditions, or its substance, will be communicated to the United Nations Committee as the opinion of the United States in its capacity as the unified command of United Nations forces in Korea.
